Even on PCs and consoles, GRID Autosport has been impressive stuff on its release. Five or so years on, it's no less surprising than a mobile title as you fire around 100 circuits, battling it out in a huge range of cars. This is a simulation. It won't be easy on you or allow you to smash through walls at top speed and carry on as if nothing happened, but driving aids will help you master what is undoubtedly the best premium racing experience on Android. Track design traditions have also been ditched, flat courses are replaced by roller-coaster-like structures that throw you around in stomach-swirling fashion. The game is divided into three phases. It starts with time cards that you pass through a specific colored gate, and ends with you taking on AI opponents, occasionally - and unsportsmanlikey - to blow them up with guns. There's a sci-fi backstory about synthetic men and corporations, but really it's all about speed. At first, the twitchy controls you'll find repeatedly smashing into tracksides and wondering if anyone should take their hovercraft license away. But master clues and controls alike, and Repulze becomes an exciting experience as you bomb along toward the finish line. Rush Rally 3 (\$3.99/£3.99/AU\$6.99) Rush Rally 3 brings console-style rally racing to Android. For quick bursts, you can dive into one rally mode, with the co-driver bellowing in the ear, or is there a grinding metal rallycross, pitting you against computer cars apparently driven by aggression. If you're in it for the long haul, immerse yourself in full career mode. None of these options would matter jot if the racing wasn't up to much. Luckily, it's really good. The game looks the part, with very clever visuals and views, whether belting around the racing circuit or burning through the forest. The controls work well, also providing a number of settings to suit a range of preferences (tilt, virtual buttons) - and skill levels. All in all, it's enough for the game to get that coveted lady flag. Horizon Chase (free + \$2.99/£2.79/AU\$4.09 IAP)If you're fed up with racing games More attention to whether asphalt looks photorealistic rather than how much fun it should be to zoom in at crazy speeds, check out Horizon Chase. This tribute to old-school arcade titles is about the love of the joy of racing, rather than boring realism. The visuals are vivid, the soundtrack is hilarious and kitschy, and racing finds that you're constantly fighting your way to the front of an aggressive pack. If you fondly remember the Lotus Turbo Esprit Challenge and Top Gear, don't miss this one. (Note that Horizon Chase gives you five free songs. To unlock the rest, there's one £2.29/US\$2.99 IAP.) Need for Speed: Most Wanted (\$4.99/£4.99/AU\$7.99) Anyone expecting the kind of free-roaming racing from the console version of this title will get upset, but Need for Speed: Most Wanted is however one of the best games of its kind on Android. Yes, the tracks are linear, only with the odd shortcut, but the actual racing bit is excellent. You belt along the seminal streets of a drab, gray city, trying to win events that will boost your ego and reputation alike. Winnings swell the coffers, allowing you to buy new vehicles to enter special events. The game looks gorgeous on Android and has a high-octane soundtrack urging you on. But mostly, this is about controls - a slick combination of responsive tilt and effortless drifting that makes everything feel closer to OutRun 2 than typically sub-optimal mobile racing fare. Riptide GP: Renegade (\$2.99/£2.99/AU\$3.99) The first two riptide games you zoom along undulating watery circuits surrounded by gleaming metal towers. Riptide GP: Renegade offers another slice of splashy futuristic racing, but this time it finds you're immersed in the seminal underbelly of the sport. As with previous games, you're still piloting a wing, and racing involves not only going very, very fast, but also massive show-offs at every available opportunity. If you hit a ramp or wave that wags you into the air, you should best hurl your ride around or make a stand in order to get a turbo-boost to land. Reasonable racers have nothing. Career mode finds you earning money, upgrading your ride, and probably ignoring slightly tedious story stunts. Racing, though, is excellent - an exciting mix of old-school arcade excitement and modern mobile touchscreen smarts. Mini Motor Racing (\$2.99/£3.19/AU\$4.49) Mini Motor Racing is a frenetic top-down racer who finds small cars darted by claustrophobic circuits that twist and turn in a clear attempt to repeatedly drive into the wall. Cars handle more like remote control cars than actual fares, meaning that races are usually tight - and easy to lose if you look away from the screen just for a while. There's a ton of content here - many dozens of races set in a wide range of environments. You can zoom in on ruins, and scoot on beachside tracks. AI is sometimes a little too aggressive, but with savvy car upgrades, and nitro increase recovery while racing, be with more than the occasional lady flag. Need for Speed: Hot Pursuit (\$4.99/£4.99/AU\$7.99) Need for Speed: Hot Pursuit exists in a world where the police seem to think it's perfectly fine to use their extremely expensive cars to ram fleeing criminals into submission. And when they don't do it, strip through the streets, racing each other (probably) to decide who pays for the day's doughnuts. He's a fairly simple racer - you're basically weaving your way across the country, smashing into other cars, and triggering the odd trap - but it's exciting, lush fun that reflects classic racers like Chase H.Q.And once you've had your filler being one of nitro-happy fuzz, you can play out a career as well as being stuck in the kind of cop-smashing criminal antics that completely won't be covered by your car manufacturer's warranty. Final Highway 2R (\$0.99/79p/AU\$0.99) Final Highway 2R is a retro racing game, quite blatantly inspired by the classic Sega OutRun. Belt in a red car, tearing up the road where everyone is rather suspiciously driving in the same direction. Every now and then you come across a fork that allows you to choose a route. All the time, kitschy music blares out the speakers of your device. For old hands, you will be in a kind of game sky. And probably, this game is better than the one that inspired it, feeling more fluid and nuanced. If you're used to more realistic fare, give the Final Freeway 2R a go - you may find yourself converted to its lush attitude, colorful visuals, and the need for really crazy speed. Motorsport Manager Mobile 3 (\$3.99/£3.99/AU\$6.49)Motorsport Manager Mobile 3 is a racing control game without boring pieces. Rather than sit in front of a celebrated table, the game is a well balanced mix of accessibility and depth, allowing you to delve into the rivets of gritty teams, sponsors, mechanics, and even livery. When you're all ready, you get to watch surprisingly tense and exciting top-down racing. (This is surprising because you largely track numbered zoom drives around circuits.) One-off races give you a feel for things, but real meat starts from the bottom of the pile in career mode, with the ultimate goal of becoming a winner. It's all efficient, slick and mobile-friendly, and a big leap from the relatively simplistic original Motorsport Manager To Mobile. Mobile.
